The Honolulu Quarterback Club, celebrating 62 Years, is pleased to announce the following Guest Speakers for their weekly luncheon, Monday, November 10th., at the Pagoda Hotel, International Ballroom beginning at 11:30 AM with a program starting at 12 Noon:

Dave Aranda - Assistant Coach - Defensive Line - University of Hawaii Football Warriors - This is the first appearance for the "Warriors" new defensive line coach, Dave Aranda. When UH Head Coach McMackin was the defensive coordinator at Texas Tech he met and mentored Coach Dave when Coach Dave was a graduate assistant. During that time, Coach Dave with the "Red Raiders", competed in three bowl games during his tenure. Prior to coming to UH, Coach Dave was the co-defensive coordinator and secondary coach at Delta State. In one year at Delta State, Coach Dave helped the school win the Gulf South conference and lead the NCAA Division II in pass efficiency defense, second in total and scoring defense and third in run defense. Before Delta State, Coach Dave, spent 2 years as the defensive coordinator and linebacker coach at his alma mater, California Lutheran, where the team led the conference in scoring defense and total defense. In 2003 -2004, Coach Dave was the linebackers coach at the University of Houston. He was on the coaching staff for the 2003 Sheraton Hawai'i Bowl where the team had suffered the triple overtime loss to the UH "Warriors". The "Warriors" have finished their 2 week road trip after losing to Utah State and playing at New Mexico State. Coach will provide us with the inside story of the break-down at Utah State and the defensive strategy he used for the New Mexico Game on Monday at the Quarterback Luncheon.

Michael Daily - President - Hawaii Polo Club - Polo Playing in Hawai'i began way back in 1886 and in 1950, became even more popular. Indoor games were held at the old Honolulu Stadium and the horses were kept at the Kapiolani Park Stables. Outdoor Polo was reintroduced during this period after the establishment of the Waikiki Polo Club. Organized Outdoor Polo Tournaments were played at Kapiolani Park until 1963 when the City of Honolulu tore down the stables. The Daily Family bought leased land from the Dillingham family and moved to the newly named Hawaii Polo Club to Mokuleia on the North Shore and was named the Mokuleia Polo Farm. The outdoor polo season begins in May and ends in September. How did the Club perform this season and who are the stars?
